My name is Bradley Calaman, and I am a student at the Pennsylvania State University. This year I am very active in the Blue and White Society which is the student contingent of the Penn State Alumni Association. My position within the Blue & White Society this year is the Relay for Life chairperson for our team. As one of our fundraisers, we are planning to hold a car show.

The event, named "Cars for Cures," will be held on Saturday March 23rd in the North Porter Parking Lot (just across from where the Joe Pa statue used to be). It will begin at noon and last until 4:00 PM. Each car that is entered will be charged a \$10 fee and placed in one of 9 classes Classic muscle cars, modern muscle cars, Japanese imports, European imports, motorcycles, off-road/trucks, antiques, tuner cars, and the clunkers cup (for those everyday cars that don't fit in anywhere but the owner still wants to join in).

Throughout the event, people that come to the show can vote for their favorite car in each class. 1 bag of white chocolate chips
¾ Cup sweetened condensed milk
1 Cup of slivered almonds
½ Cup raisins
1 Tbsp. orange zest

Prepare your 8x8 dish by lining it with aluminum foil. Microwave sweetened condensed milk and white chips until they are melted about 1 min. 30 sec., stirring every 30 sec. until creamy. Remove from microwave and stir in the raisins and orange zest.

Pour immediately into your foil lined pan. Refrigerate for at least 2 hrs. Take the fudge out of frig, remove foil and cut into small pieces

Fannie Farmer's famous Cookbooks.

I am sure most of you ladies have heard from your Mother or Grandmother of the Fannie Farmers cookbooks. On March 23 2013, she would have celebrated her 156 th birthday.

Fannie was born in Massachusetts. At the age of 16, she suffered a paralytic stroke which left her unable to walk so she could not continue her education.

During this time, she took up cooking, turning her Mother's house into a boarding house with high quality meals. At the age of 30, she was now able to walk but had a bad limp that never left her. At this time she enrolled in the Boston Cooking School. She trained there until 1889 and two years later became the school's principal.

Her first cookbook "the Boston Cooking School Cookbook was printed in 1896 at her cost and 3000 copies were sold. This cookbook introduced the measuring spoon and measuring cups. Later this cookbook was referred to as the "Fanny Farmer Cookbook" and was the Best Seller of the era.

In 1902 Fannie left the Boston Cooking School and created Miss Farmer's School of Cooking teaching and creating more Cookbooks. Today her reprints of her cookbooks are still available to purchase.

Even during the last seven years of her life she still created recipes. She was truly a remarkable woman.

AACA is the premier antique vehicle organization because we know how to do the big things that truly impact our hobby. One has only to look at the Hershey Fall Meet to see how one large Region has figured out how to work together, put on the greatest show on earth, and have a great time doing it since the 1950's. The Dollar Saver

**Save money and time on
mechanical problems. Keep
track of wires, bolts, etc.! –**

If your project involves many parts over many days, keep track of everything. Label label, label!! Time is money, these tips especially when ready to reassembly. It really does save time during reassembly and you do not have to look all over the place for a lost item and still not find it. You will not waste time and money buying the item you lost.

After removal of an item, thread the bolts back so that it's impossible for them to get lost. Put the ones that cannot be put back onto a large piece of cardboard with tape and label directly on the cardboard or in zip lock storage bags and label with a permanent marker. Never use pencil to make labels since the lead can get wiped off.

If you remove a hose or electrical plug that may not fit in a zip lock bag, label both sides so you can easily identify both sides and keep your parts all together.

When dismantling you antique car, zip lock bags will be your best friend.

24th Annual Orphan Car* Tour

“Williamsport, MD Wanderlust”

Dust off your “orphan” antique car and prepare for an outing in the country, in the company of other old car enthusiasts.

The Orphan Tour is held in a different part of the greater Washington-Baltimore area each year. Its purpose is to encourage the driving enjoyment of antique “orphan” vehicles which were produced either by now-defunct manufacturers or by the discontinued divisions of surviving companies. For the past two years the tour has attracted a turnout of 64 vehicles.

This year’s afternoon adventure includes stops at **Fort Frederick State Park** (visitor center, restored 1756 fort and barracks, Civilian Conservation Corps museum), the **C & O Canal National Historic Park** (aqueduct, turning basin, warehouse with visitor center, lock, lock house, two unique bridges and trolley powerhouse), and the private **automobile collection** of D.M. Bowman. You’ll also visit an operating **general store**, circa 1883, with attached antiques shop and a home furnishings shop upstairs. The route covers less than 35-40 miles.

We assemble at Byron Memorial Park, E. Potomac St. (Rte. 11), Williamsport MD at 12:00 noon on Saturday. Cars are then released onto the tour one at a time, travelling scenic rural and secondary roads following printed directions.

The tour ends at the Park where a buffet dinner is served. Dinner reservations must be postmarked by **May 27**. Our limit is 120, and last year we had almost that many — so reserve early! You can cancel until the 27th. (After that, we’ll try to sell your ticket for you, since there’s often a waiting list for tickets on Tour day!) Dinner is optional; you can take the tour only, attend the dinner only, or do both!

The buffet dinner includes choice of meat (seasoned top round or garlic herb chicken); parsley potatoes, sautéed green beans, salad, rolls & butter, dessert (cake), and beverages. Reservations required (**deadline: May 27**). Your meal ticket will be given to you at the Tour. No meal refunds guaranteed after May 27.
